



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Message from Chief Tobin

The City of Temple is in a period of tremendous growth. In order to respond to this growth and continue to serve residents at the highest level, the department has strategically added resources in the past year. This allocation of resources paid off as total crime decreased by 12 percent and violent crime dropped by 16 percent. These figures are indicative of the proactive efforts of our officers to keep Temple a safe and enjoyable place to live. 2019 saw a total of 115,595 recorded dispatch events, including 44,148 officer initiated events, and 71,447 calls for service. Our community oriented efforts continue strongly with 58 courses taught and participation in 138 special events.

As we enter into 2020, the members of TPD look forward to serving our community and strengthening the relationship between the department and the community we serve.



Patrol Equipment

Patrol officers were upgraded with brand new equipment in 2019. All patrol vehicle dashboard and body worn cameras have been switched over to the Axon system. Officers were also given new conducted energy devices (Taser) which are much more efficient than the old model.

K-9 Unit

One of our K-9 patrol dogs, Birk, was retired in late 2019. He was replaced along with two additional dogs. Now there is a K-9 available on each of the four patrol shifts ready to support the department's mission.

FARO

FARO is a 3D imaging system capable of capturing a crime or traffic reconstruction scene accurately and effectively. This new system will allow our investigators to process a scene up to 50% faster and more accurately than with the older system.



Patrol Bureau

The Patrol Bureau is comprised of four main patrol teams each with its own K-9 unit. The teams are divided into day and night shifts to ensure a constant police presence throughout the city. This ensures safety and security for all Temple residents around the clock.

The Investigations Bureau includes many different units, each with critical functions. There are four main investigative units including Special Investigations, Violent Crimes, Special Crimes, and Property Crimes. This bureau also consists of the Special Operations Division, the Crime Scene Unit, and the Property & Evidence Unit.





Administration Bureau

Administration is the main support bureau of the Temple Police Department and includes Operations, Records, Community Service, and Animal Services. Professional Standards is another component of this bureau, and is made up of the Training, Public Information, and Internal Affairs units.

Department Personnel

As of January 1, 2020, the Temple Police Department was authorized 154 Sworn Law Enforcement Officers and 38.5 Civilian Staff Members.



Patrol & Field Services










Field Services carries out the primary functions of the Temple Police Department; to uphold the law, prevent crime, and protect the residents of Temple. These officers work tirelessly day and night to keep the city safe and improve the quality of life for our citizens. They are the first to respond to a number of emergency situations, often putting their own lives on the line. The hard work and dedication of these men and women saw an overall 12% decrease in crime between 2018 and 2019.

Patrol Districts

2019 saw a total of 115,595 police related events throughout Temple's eight patrol districts. Breaking the city up into smaller areas allows computer-aided dispatch and calls for service to be evenly distributed throughout the city. This results in quicker response times, consistent officer visibility, increased officer safety, and enough allocation for police resources should the need arise.

Criminal & Special Investigations







The Investigation Bureau detectives work alongside crime scene technicians in order to gather evidence and analyze even the smallest details. Each of the four main investigative units specialize in their own areas of expertise. The Violent Crimes Unit covers crimes against persons. The Property Crimes Unit investigates theft, burglary, vandalism, and financial crimes. The Special Crimes Unit is responsible for solving missing persons cases, sex crimes, and those involving children, regardless if they are victims or suspects. Finally, the Special Investigations Unit is tasked with cases involving human trafficking and illegal narcotics.

Administration & Support



The Temple Police Department is proud to have its many non-sworn staff members working diligently behind the scenes, maintaining internal department operations, and supporting those out in the field. Community Service Technicians provide a line of communication between officers and those who need assistance. The Records Unit assists officers with reports and supplemental materials. Finally, the Professional Standards Unit is tasked with public relations, recruiting, training, and the handling of all internal affairs investigations.

Special Operations









The Special Operations Division falls under the Investigations Bureau, and is made up of several units. The Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) Unit is the spearhead of the department's community policing initiative. School Resource Officers are tasked with protecting our students. The Traffic Unit is tasked with responding to traffic collisions and ensuring that Temple's drivers maintain safety while behind the wheel. SWAT is a part time unit tasked with responding to high risk warrants and hostage situations.

Since June 2018, Animal Services has been part of the Temple Police Department, specifically under the Administration Bureau. This change allowed for a more streamlined method of support from the department, including resources and communication. Animal Services is tasked with finding homes for stray or displaced pets, assisting in animal cruelty cases, rescuing animals in distress, and responding to a variety of other animal related calls throughout the city. Its many devoted volunteers also support in the care and safety of all animals in need.

Community Policing Events & Outreach

National Night Out







National Night Out is a nation wide initiative, and one of TPD's biggest events of the year. The department partners with local churches, organizations, community watches, and other event coordinators to plan out several block parties throughout the city. Thousands of residents come out and join officers in food, fun, and community support. The goal of this event, is to strengthen the bond between local law enforcement and the citizens of Temple. This year's event was another fantastic success!

Burgers with the Badge





Another large annual event hosted by TPD, Burgers with the Badge is an opportunity for residents to come together with law enforcement. Temple residents come out to enjoy the sunshine and lunch provided by the department.

Torch Run/Tip-a-Cop





Every year, the department participates in several events devoted to helping children with disabilities. The Tip-a-Cop event helps raise money in support of Special Olympics Texas. During the summer, a team of officers will also participate in the Law Enforcement Torch Run.


Operation: Blue Santa

This is a prestigious honor that only 152 state agencies have received. TPD plans to continue upholding this high standard in the years to come.


